



What I've Learnt Lately...

Sue Ledger Portrait & figure artist

A new member to our Portraits and Figures working together group, Thea Jonker, recently shared her knowledge of the "Grid Maker for Drawing", an app on a mobile phone or any digital device to help reproduce an image of the reference photo of the same or different scale.


I've used various methods to reproduce an image of my reference photo onto my paper/ canvas with the correct proportions. From using a lightbox to rubbing pencil on the back of the printed photo then tracing over it to leave a graphite line on my paper to work from. These methods are



only useful if the photo is the size you want your sketch to be, and is translucent. You can always enlarge the image in a photocopier if you can work out the percentage increase you want.

I've found that grids can be more useful for enlarging the reference photo and getting the proportions accurate, a useful book is "*Drawing using grids. Portraits of babies and Children*" by Giovanni Civardi. Printing out the image and drawing the grid on it is time consuming. Until Thea showed me the app on my mobile.

The Grid maker can overlay a grid on a photo in my phone, the grid is moveable, can be customised, the number of squares can be adjusted, black grid over a light image or white grid for sketching on black car. Then I just create a corresponding grid on my choice of medium. I can zoom in on my phone to see more detail.



The grid method helps break down complex images into manageable sections allowing for precise and proportional drawing. It can also be used for photography enthusiasts to aid in composition, perspective alignment and mapping in landscapes. Knitters and those doing tapestry can even use it to work out a pattern from an image. There are numerous free Grid maker apps to be found by Googling them. Thank you to the members of our working together group for sharing your knowledge and experience.

What I have learnt this month is all about **Budgies**. In trying to make greeting cards I bought a book containing beautiful photos of them.

After creating several cards, I decided I should know more about this beautiful Australian icon. I was aware all budgerigars breed in the western plains around the waterholes and quite prolific in West Australia. They thrive in dry conditions and are known as desert nomads.




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The first native wild Australian budgie arrived in Europe around 1840 and has captivated the world with their beauty ever since. The Australian budgie remains smaller than the English version, which was selectively bred and is now bigger and more colourful.

Think I now have "budgie mania" and totally enjoy creating my little paintings (as at right) with coloured pencils, watercolours and ink.
